Did you know, your Grand Lodge possesses (possibly) the only known proof that Antonio López de Santa Anna was a Freemason? Though speculated for years, the fraternal membership of the four-time president of Mexico and military leader was Masonic lore until the Library staff came across the "Santa Anna Certificate." Unfortunately, the Santa Anna Certificate has seen better days. Still, we have worked with a conservationist to frame and display the historical and fraternal document. The above hyperlink shows the conserved Santa Anna Certificate, along with a Scottish Rite publication on the significance of the document to fraternal and US history.

As a reminder, the Library is here to provide Masonic light and services to all within our Grand Jurisdiction. ### The New York Masonic Genealogy Project

This summer, the Livingston Masonic Library embarked on the New York Masonic genealogy project. The aim of this project is to consolidate the member records of New York Masons into one searchable internal database that will make it easier for the Library to verify membership for members of Masonic Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of the State of New York. Since July, four Masonic volunteers have already reached out to the Library expressing interested in working on this project. In addition to planning the overall workflow for consolidating the Masonic member records, we have transcribed over 500 names from the 1832-1853 Grand Lodge of New York member register into Excel. Many of the volunteers who have come forward are interested in performing this transcription work, scheduled to begin this fall.

The work of the New York Masonic Genealogy project has verified the Masonic membership of some prominent New York individuals. For example, the microfilmed lodge returns revealed that Lyman G. Bloomingdale, one of the co-founders of Bloomingdale's, was a Mason in New York. The lodge returns show that he received his Masonic degrees in Adelphi Lodge No. 23, located in Manhattan, New York: he was initiated on September 2, 1872, passed on September 16, 1872, and raised on October 7, 1872. Bloomingdale became a Mason the same year he co-founded the namesake-department store with his brother, Joseph B. Bloomingdale. Bro. Bloomingdale would eventually demit from Adelphi Lodge in 1883 to join Mount Neboh Lodge No. 257 (also located in Manhattan, New York), but he remained a Mason in good standing until his death on October 12, 1905.

### **Royal Ark Mariners Degree Artifacts**

A few weeks ago, a researcher reached out to us, searching for the 'Royal Ark Mariner Degree' artifact in our collection. Upon working with this research, I came aware of the ultra rare artifacts we have in the Grand Lodge of New York collection. *This Lamplight* is the perfect opportunity to share a bit of the artifacts' story with those who might find them interesting.

The artifact is a silk apron, decorated with printed imagery and rainbow color trim on the edge. The engraving has the reference of Moses' Noah Ark and symbols of various Masonic degrees. While there is no information of this apron in the library index, it was mentioned in the Transaction of American Lodge of Research.



According to Bro. Ward K. St. Clair, the Grand Lodge of New York received the apron in 1949 from Bro. John. B. Mullan, who received it from Secretary of George Washington Memorial Association, who originally received it from J. Carleton Esty, the grandson of Bro. Charles Esty who was a member of Morton Commandery No. 4, of New York City in 1872.<sup>1</sup>

The plate it was printed from was made by Daniel Dodd and John Luckington, and published in London by Isaac Moseley, Ebenezer Sibly, Charles Sinclair, and William Hannam in 1794.1,2 They were British Masons who were, more or less, involved with Knights Templar and Royal Ark Mariners Degree. William Hannam was the Acting Grand Master of Knights Templar. Charles Sinclair also appeared as Secretary in the Knight Templar warrants and was a Grand Equerry in the Grand Conclave in 1807.<sup>2</sup>

Apparently, the Grand Lodge of New York's archive claims that there are only six known artifacts printed from this engraving design, and two of them are in the Grand Lodge of New York's possession. The only

After the apron is identified, it led to another artifact in certificate collection, the Warrant of Granville Encampment of New York. The Grand Lodge received the warrant in 1940 from Bro. Morris Rote-Rosen, Past Master of Granville Lodge No. 55, who received it from Mrs. Ada Tobey. <sup>2</sup>



Granville Encampment was warranted in 1803 by the British Royal Ark Mariners, granted the authority to work on "make and install Masons in all superior Degrees above Craft Masonry, except the Royal Arch."<sup>2</sup> The other known warrant of this kind, from the same officers, was issued to Washington Encampment in New London.<sup>3</sup>

After the Grand Commandery of New York was organized, the Granville Encampment requested to join but it was unsuccessful, they were nonetheless still active until 1826, the same year when the Morgan Excitement and Anti-Masonic Movement broke out. <sup>2</sup>
